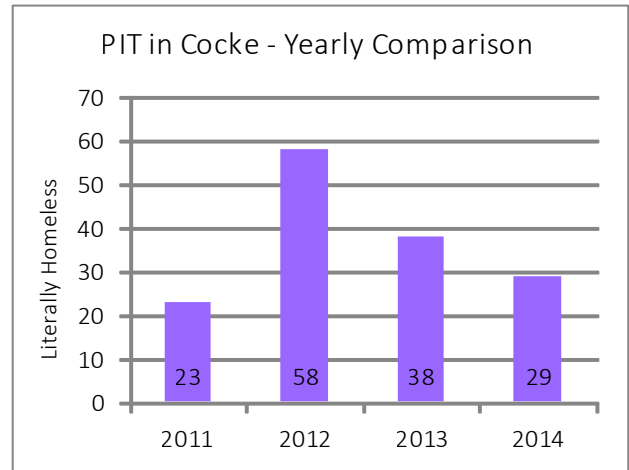

A point-in-time count is an unduplicated count on a single night of the people in a specific county who are experiencing homelessness. It includes both sheltered and unsheltered populations. This count is mandated by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and is coordinated by County mayors in conjunction with Tennessee Valley Coalition to End Homelessness.

Shelt-ES: literally homeless in shelter
 Shelt-TH: literally homeless in transitional housing
 Unshelt: literally homeless; living in place not meant for human habitation
 Prec. Hsd: Precariously Housed—almost homeless; living w/others

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964: "No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance." Tennessee Valley Coalition to End Homelessness (TVCEH) maintains that no individual should be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination on the basis of disability, military service, religion, age, sex, gender identity/expression, or sexual orientation in relationship to any program or activity conducted by TVCEH regardless of whether those programs and activities are Federally funded or not.
