Bridging the Gaps for the Tennessee Valley Region

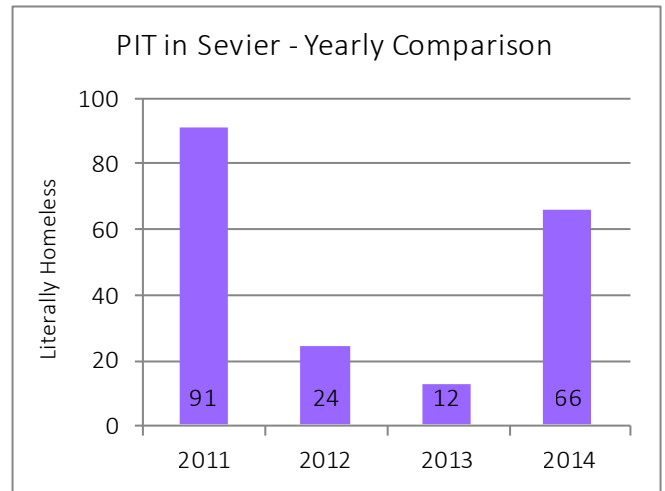
