

- Started in 2002
- First home completed in 2004
- Over 100 homes completed since
- 2022 Re-start



Differences between Habitat




- Can serve up to Moderate Income applicants (60-120% AMI)
- Utilizes additional grant funding via CHDO designation to build affordably and subsidize costs of construction
- Can serve Blount, Loudon, Sevier, and Monroe Counties
- Builds one and two story homes, typically with attached garage



- Serves low-income applicants and below (<80% AMI)
- Utilizes volunteer labor and sweat equity to build affordably, also relies on philanthropic giving and fundraisers to subsidize cost of construction
- Serves Blount County only
- Builds single level homes

Blount County's Need for Housing



The Situation



Shortage of affordable housing

- Difficult to develop
 - Increases in labor and material cost
 - Increases in land cost
- Losing NOAH's
 - Naturally occurring affordable housing
 - Higher income buyers



Increase in demand

- Growing number of low-income households
 - Moving for employment
 - Graduating high school
 - Households becoming costburdened by rent increases



Rapidly increasing costs

- Depressed supply
- Increasing demand
- Higher values

Homeownership Program

- Targeting 80% AMI and below (Low-income)
- Qualifies eligible applicants for low-interest USDA mortgage
- Mortgage can be used to purchase FCDC built/rehabbed homes OR buy on the open market.
 - Why would you want to buy open market vs. FCDC built/rehabbed?
 - Building capacity
 - Household size





Must be low-income

Determined by annual USDA banded income limits* (60-80% AMI)

*This threshold changes depending on funding being used.

Must be able to afford the

mortgage of \$205,000

Debt, Credit, and More

- Existing debt affects applicant's ability to repay
- Credit score must be 640 or higher
- Other requirements may be applicable depending on funding sources being used

Basic Criteria

Types of units



New Construction

- Variety of available floor plans that buyers can choose
- 2 level, 1 level, ADA accessible, with or without garage
- 3 bed, 2 bath minimum currently
- 1200-1400 sq. ft. living space




Rehabilitation

- Neighborhood revitalization
- Typically lower 1st mortgage requirements
- Faster turnaround


Application Timeline


New Construction



Rental Program

- Targeting 50% AMI and below
- Section 8 voucher based
- 1st units are planned for development (duplex)
- Pending funding application

Higher costs to construct housing makes units less affordable.

Land Inventory

Depleting land inventory

Increased cost of land limits affordability

Zoning challenges prevent creative solutions

- Working with local gov. to clearly communicate barriers






Active Participants by County
