

What is the AHAR



The Annual Homeless Assessment Report (AHAR) is a HUD report to the U.S. Congress that provides nationwide estimates of homelessness, including information about the demographic characteristics of homeless persons, service use patterns, and the capacity to house homeless persons.

What is the LSA???



The Longitudinal Systems Analysis (LSA) report, produced from a CoC's Homelessness Management Information System (HMIS) and submitted annually to HUD.



Both the LSA and System Performance Measures (SPM) are important! Both are data that come from HMIS.

What is the PIT?



The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. Each count is planned, coordinated, and carried out locally.



HUD requires that CoCs conduct an annual count of people experiencing homelessness who are: un- sheltered or sheltered.

What is the PIT? (continued)




The unsheltered count, an enumeration and demographic survey of unsheltered individuals and families – on the streets,

in tents,

in vehicles

and sleeping in other locations not intended for sleeping.





The sheltered count, an enumeration and demographic survey of individuals and families in:

- emergency shelters,
- domestic violence shelters,
- transitional housing programs,
- hotels/motels paid for through community resources.

What is the HIC?




The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is a point-in-time inventory of provider programs within a Continuum of Care that provide <u>beds and units</u> dedicated to serve people experiencing homelessness (and, for permanent housing projects, where homeless at entry, per the <u>HUD homeless definition</u>).

The HIC is categorized by five Program Types:


- 1. Emergency Shelter
- 2. Transitional Housing
- 3. Safe Haven
- 4. Rapid Re-housing
- Permanent Supportive Housing.






