



Updates in Homelessness



Supreme Court's Ruling in the City of Grants Pass, Oregon v. Johnson

Case: Is it cruel and unusual punishment for cities to fine, ticket, and arrest individuals sleeping outside even if there are no shelter options available?

Timeline: The Supreme Court heard oral arguments in April and released the ruling in late June.

Decision: "Under the ruling, localities will be able to arrest, ticket, and fine people for sleeping outdoors on public property, even if leaders have failed to produce enough affordable housing or shelter for everyone in the community who needs it. "

- National Alliance to End Homelessness

Impact: Decreased trust in nonprofit agencies/ministries, possible decreased funding, increased burden on the criminal justice system, increased time to housing for folks who will now have a criminal background, which can keep them from housing and jobs

Next Steps: Advocate for sustainable solutions within communities, including—but not limited to—rental assistance programs, homelessness prevention, housing production accessible to those with the lowest incomes, and an increase in homeless assistance programs.








Rank & Review Committee



- Project applications submitted to the CoC for the FY 2024 application cycle must be reviewed and accepted/ ranked, approved, or rejected by the CoC.
- The Rank & Review Committee is looking for 3 -5 individuals from community partners to help with the rank and review process for 2024 NOFO, which includes the following responsibilities:
 - Help develop and update TVCoC ranking tools
 - Participate in the review and ranking process
 - Help document scores during the ranking process
 - Submit ranking outcomes to TVCoC membership
- Time Commitment
 - Up to 1 hour/ week leading up to NOFO announcement (typically early to mid July)
 - 4-6 hours (broken into 2 days) to rank projects as a committee
 - Time commitment will increase during the review week to accommodate the review of all project applications. This can vary depending on each committee member.

PIT & HIC Committee



The purpose of the 2025 Point -in -Time count is to produce a point in -time estimate of people who are experiencing homelessness in the Tennessee Valley CoC's 12 -county geographic area. The purpose of the 2025 Housing Inventory Chart (HIC) is to produce an accurate reflection of the CoC's capacity to house homeless and formerly homeless persons .



This committee helps to plan this roount each year.

The PIT & HIC Committee is looking for 12 or more individuals from community

partners to help with the count in each of their counties to develop the methodologies and process for the 2025 PIT Count, which includes the following responsibilities:

- Recruiting & Training Volunteers
- Develop the Day of the Count Plan
- Provide Volunteer & Count support on the day of the Count
- Turning in their County's Unsheltered Count Summary & Survey Forms

<u>Time Commitment</u> –20 –25 hours (over the next 6 months)

- 5 one-hour long Committee Planning Meetings
- 1 Train-the-Trainer Training Session
- Time commitment will increase leading up to the count
- Approximately 8 hours for the night-day of the count
